

Are We Once Saved, Always Saved?

- I. This doctrine was first taught by the devil (Gen. 3:1-5).
- II. A righteous person can turn from righteousness and be lost (Ez. 18:24).
- III. It is possible for a child of God to fall from grace (Gal. 5:1-4; Heb. 12:15).
- IV. A Christian can become a castaway (1 Cor. 9:27).
- V. A Christian can fall away so as to be lost (1 Cor. 10:12; Heb. 6:4-9).
- VI. We can be severed from God (Rom. 11:22).
- VII. Christians can depart from God in unbelief (Heb. 3:12).
- VIII. Christians can draw back unto perdition (Heb. 10:38-39).
- IX. A child of God can err from the truth and be spiritually dead (Jam. 5:19-20).
- X. There were angels that lost fellowship with God; so can we (2 Pet. 2:1-4, 15).
- XI. If a Christian falls away, he is “worse than lost.” (2 Pet. 2:19-22).
- XII. Hatred of one’s brethren results in apostasy (1 Jn. 3:14-15).
- XIII. Our name can be erased from the book of life (Rev. 3:5).
- XIV. A Christian named Simon fell away (Ac. 8:12-13, 18-24).
- XV. Salvation is conditional (Jn. 8:51; Col. 1:23; 2 Tim. 2:19; 1 Pet. 1:5; Rev. 2:10)
- XVI. The seal of the Holy Spirit can be broken (2 Tim. 2:19; Ps. 51:11).
